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## MONROE'S MANDOLIN INDUCTED INTO HALL OF FAME By Rod Moag

On September 13 of 2005, a unique and very touching ceremony took place at the Country Music Hall of Fame in Nashville on the occasion of Bill Monroe's 94th birth anniversary. Through the good graces of a Nashville friend, this reporter was one of a crowd of some 400 special invitees who witnessed the induction of Bill Monroe's Gibson F5 mandolin into the HOF's permanent collection. Rickie Skaggs played the mandolin as he and Kentucky Thunder opened the program performing "Mother's Not Dead."

Speeches by various dignitaries of the Country Music Association followed, including remarks by current president Vince Gill and 30-year Grand Ole Opry director Bud Wendel. The mandolin was described by all as "Monroe's

musical partner," highlighting the role which the mandolin played in establishing what we know today as the classic bluegrass sound. James Monroe, from whom the instrument was purchased, also spoke and affirmed that his father's wish was for his mandolin to rest in the Country Music Hall of Fame and Museum. Part of the arrangement for acquisition specified that terms of the agreement not be made public. Monroe last played the mandolin on the Opry on March 15, 1996, a few months before his passing on September 9 of that year.

Acquisition of Monroe's musical partner was arranged by filanthropist Bob McClain, who had also earlier arranged for Mother Maybelle Carter's famous Gibson guitar to be added to the HOF's collection. Various speakers recounted bits of the history of the mandolin—serial number 73987 signed by Lloyd Loar on July 9, 1923--purchased from a Miami Florida barber shop in 1945, the year that Monroe put together his classic band comprised of Lester Flatt, Earl Scruggs, Chubby Wise and Howard Watts. They recounted how Monroe had become upset with the Gibson company and scratched the Gibson name off the peghead, how the mandolin had been smashed to bits with a fireplace poker by an irate woman then meticulously reassembled by a master luthier, how Gibson had later restored the mandolin following Monroe's reconciliation with the company. Skaggs, still playing Monroe's mandolin, provided several further classic numbers, continued on page 4...

with the Grasscals invited to join them to close the show with Uncle Pen. Immediately following the ceremony the mandolin was placed on permanent exhibit in a sealed glass case on the third floor of the HOF.

Also in the Hall of Fame for the next year is a "spotlight exhibit" on Earl Scruggs, sole survivor of the classic Monroe band of 1945-48, who was also in attendance at the ceremony. The exhibit features Earl's first banjo, costumes, other instruments and memorabilia. It's wonderful to see that the Country Music Association is giving such prominent recognition to some of our bluegrass stars.

This reporter had the Monroe mandolin in his own hands in 1955 when he met Monroe for the first time. A short four years later, the mandolin was hung around the neck of then six-year-old Ricky Skaggs during a Monroe performance at a school in Eastern Kentucky. Who knows how many hands have touched this fabled mandolin through the five decades that it was Monroe's musical partner.

### The Best of Bluegrass (Old Settler's Music Festival, comntinued from last month)

Pillars of the bluegrass world like Doc Watson, Vassar Clements, Del McCoury, Tim O'Brian, Hot Rize, Peter Rowan, Alison Krause, David Grissman, and Bela Fleck have helped Old Settler's make its reputation as a premier bluegrass event. And while Old Settler's is known as a bluegrass festival, it embraces offshoots of the genre also.

The official music starts Thursday night over in the campground pavilion with a show just for the campers. The festival's main stages get going across the street on Friday afternoon, and go until midnight. Saturday it starts all over again, and the grounds fill with people relaxing on blankets, lawn chairs, and even the occasional hammock, as they sit back and enjoy the music.

There are also workshops during the weekend taught by the mainstage artists. Past attendees learned fiddle techniques from Vassar Clements and banjo licks from Bela Fleck. Watching and listening to the artists play together during the workshops is a show unto itself, a one of a kind event not to be missed. Best of all, the workshops are open to anyone who wants to show up and they're free to all festival attendees.

Before, during, and after the official stage acts, you'll find music in the campgrounds, too. For many, this big picking party is the best part of the festival, and they come from all over the U.S. to reconnect with friends from past years and listen and play. Even locals who could easily drive home opt to pitch a tent or hook up an RV so they can play music with friends (and new friends!) or wander the campground as listeners until the wee hours. (There's also a family camping area for those who prefer a quiet place to sleep).

Eat, Shop, Wade in the Water.

You won't go hungry while you're at the festival. The organizers make a point of finding food providers who offer a variety of tasty choices instead of the typical turkey legs and fried everything. Beer, soft drinks and water are available at two conveniently placed Watering Holes staffed by some of the 200+ volunteers.

Many festival fans take advantage of the creek as they listen to music and visit with friends. You can wade in the water, lounge on the boulders, or just stretch out on the patio-like stone bank under the shade trees.

It's also fun to check out the vendors offering straw hats, cotton clothing, hand-made soaps, jewelry, and more. Many have become festival fixtures and festival goers greet them as old friends. That friendly, welcoming, "we're all here to have fun" attitude may be what long-time fans love most about Old Settlers. Best of all, you don't have to be an old-timer to feel welcome. Even first-time festival goers will find everyone from the volunteers to fellow guests greeting them with a smile. One reviewer called Old Settler's "a festival that's found the perfect mix of acts, manageable crowds, April breezes along the banks of Onion Creek and music that dares to wear a happy face."

So mark April 20-23, 2006 on your calendars now and plan to be there next year. Tickets go on sale September, and there are discounts for buying early. For more information, visit the web site at oldsettlersmusicfest.org.

### Bea Lilly, 1921-2005

We are sorry to report that Bea Lilly, member of The Lily Brothers & Don Stover and a true pioneer in bluegrass music, passed away September 18, 2005 at the Duxbury House Alzheimer Care Center near Plymouth, MA.

Mitchell Burt Lilly, who came to be known as Bea, was born in Clear Creek, WV, as was his brother Everett, his partner in The Lilly Brothers. Bea played guitar and Everett mandolin, and the popularity of the style that came to be known as "brother duets" helped propel them to some early success through their regular broadcasts on the powerful WWVA radio station in Wheeling during the '40s.

In the 1950s, the Lillys joined forces with fiddler Tex Logan and banjo picker Don Stover to form The Lilly Brothers & Don Stover, who were inducted into the IBMA Hall Of Honor in 2002. Logan and Stover both hailed from northeastern US, and the band eventually settled there in 1952. They are credited by many New England bluegrass pickers as having made a major contribution to the establishment and growth of bluegrass in that part of the US. Their performances at The Hillbilly Ranch in Boston are fondly recalled by a great many Boston bluegrassers, and brought the music to the attention of large numbers of people who might not have discovered it otherwise.

Everett returned to WV in 1970 after the tragic death of his son, Jiles, in an auto accident. Bea moved to WV as well for a short time, only to return to Boston where he remained. The band would reassemble sporadically for shows until Don Stover's death in 1996.

Bea's funeral will be held on Thursday, September 22, and his passing will be mourned by bluegrass fans and musicians in the northeast, and everywhere that the pioneers of our music are fondly remembered.
